## OUR APPROACH

At KIPP San Jose Collegiate, students complete a college-prep course load that exceeds the University of California A-G requirements. Each student completes 13 hours of community service annually during their 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup>, and 12<sup>th</sup> grade years, and participates in after-school tutorial sessions. Our scholars attend school from 8:00 a.m. to 4:15 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, and Friday; from 8:00 a.m. to 2:15 p.m. Wednesday; and from 8:00 a.m. to 3:20 p.m. Thursday.





% of students meeting or exceeding standards in ELA\*




% of students meeting or exceeding standards in Math\*




## ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP) EXAMS

The mission of KIPP Bay Area Public Schools is to operate high-achieving public schools in educationally underserved communities, developing in our students the knowledge, skills and character essential to thrive in college, shape their futures, and positively impact the world.
